#### **BOOKSHOP ASSISTANT'S EXPERIENCES**

Dominic had always been a quiet and studious boy and had emerged from his secondary school with good exam results but little else. He was expected to join the other handful of pupils who had won a place at university. Yet, somewhere inside his head a voice said it was time he experienced the real world before continuing his studies, so to everyone's surprise he decided to take a year off. 'No good will come of it,' people said, 'he won't get round to applying for a place and he'll spend the next year drifting aimlessly – he is such a dreamer.'

Nevertheless, Dominic wandered into 'Archer and Son', the bookshop by the market square, which he had frequently visited with his father and asked if there were any positions available. Jobs were rarely advertised and were usually filled by word of mouth or family connections. Yet, on this occasion, Dominic was in luck as one of the staff had just left.

After the briefest of interviews, Dominic was given a job to begin immediately as Mr Pinkerton, the manager, prided himself on his ability to assess character and felt he had made an excellent choice as Dominic was willing and hard-working and knew a great deal about books for his age. His father comforted himself with the thought that he would at least be rubbing shoulders with the academic world. For his part, Dominic swiftly rid himself of his much hated schoolboy image. He soon felt accepted by his colleagues, Vic, John, Caroline and the strangely threatening Malcolm. Much of the time the staff interacted through a mixture of teasing, jokes and affectionate insults.

Yet, three months later this easy atmosphere had become strained and tense. Startlingly large sums of money had been disappearing from the till. Mr Pinkerton was reluctant to contemplate that one of his hand-picked assistants or accounts staff could be responsible and felt that the money had been taken by a lurking customer who struck when the till was left unguarded. Consequently, he worked out a rota so that only one person of the five who worked in the English literature department would be responsible for opening the till and ringing up any sales. The person concerned would be glued to his post virtually all day long.

Despite the new system the money continued to disappear and everyone including Dominic felt under suspicion. The thought that anyone of the genteel staff would be involved in anything like stealing was horrifying and he felt there must be a simple, harmless explanation for the discrepancies between the money on the roll of receipts and the money in the till at the end of the day. As time went on he started to question his own sanity wondering if he might be an unaware kleptomaniac. At times he felt the tension so hard to cope with that he was tempted to admit to the crime himself. And whenever it was his turn to man the till, he was terrified in case an honest mistake was interpreted as criminal behaviour.

By now, the relationship between the team of assistants had been poisoned for good and they all took to watching each other furtively from the corner of their eyes. Nevertheless, everyone found time to sympathise with Pinkerton who had aged ten years in just a few months. At the end of the fifth month the losses were still mounting and Dominic convinced himself that Vic and Malcolm working in concert were responsible.

In true detective story fashion when the end came and the thief was unmasked it took everyone by surprise. Mr Pinkerton had employed an agency to observe the activities in the shop and the offender turned out to be Caroline, the daughter of a Professor of Ancient Languages, who had seemed totally above reproach and suspicion.
